ASCM members are fully qualified doctors at a comprehensive range of cosmetic medicine clinics throughout Australia, supplying a full range of cosmetic medicine procedures.

The Australasian College of Aesthetic Medicine (ACAM) was formed in 2009. This is a fellowship of medical practitioners trained to high professional standards, whose objective is to serve the community

by providing high quality care. ACAM offers a training program to produce medical practitioners who are safe, skilled and competent in the management of all aspects of aesthetic medicine.

Each year, ASCM and ACAM support the Laser and Cosmetic Medicine Conference, which brings local and international experts together to share their knowledge about the latest advances in non-surgical cosmetic procedures and provide training workshops. **The next conference will be held in Sydney on September 17-18, 2011 at the Sydney Convention and Exhibition Centre in Darling Harbour.**

The main conference is for medical practitioners, but courses for nurses and aestheticians in cosmetic medicine are also offered.
